Started at the Court of Appeals in 1951. She was 17 years old. She started as a clerk typist in the Clerks office and later became secretary. She worked for the court of appeals for 19 years. Her office was in the State Capitol. W.G. England was the clerk. Each Judge had one law clerk. Her offices were near the Supreme Court Justices. She remembers a wash bowl and a pitcher of water in the office. She worked Monday thru Saturday. Saturday hours were until 12:30pm. She dealt very little with the judges. They stayed in there offices. They did not mingle like they do now.

If a case was appealed to the Supreme Court it had to be retyped to submit it. If someone wanted a copy of an opinion she would have to retype it. She used a Remington non electric typewriter. They later got a Xerox machine. They copies were wet and had to be dried.

Her other job duties consisted of dispensing supplies to law clerks.

When she worked there people were not allowed in the Courtroom.

She was paid \$140 a month. Every year she received a \$10 month raise.

Judges ate lunch at a tea room across from the capitol.

After 19 years at the Court of Appeals she accepted a job with the Supreme Court as special deputy clerk. She stayed there for 17 years.
